

### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

However, going through the pandemic together has tightened relationships and strengthened the vision and missionary zeal of these groups.

This year 16 of our graduates will join us as missionaries, our biggest group ever! This growth in our staff teams

means we are able to redouble our efforts to reach the lost on our current campuses. It also means we are continuing to move ahead with our plan to plant a new outreach at the University of Kentucky in the fall! This goal has driven many of our efforts to clarify our vision, grow our teams, and improve our training. We have a great group of missionaries who will be heading down this summer; please pray for us!

My friends, our world is at a time of great upheaval, of significant change, and of confusion. But we do not need to be afraid. God is calling a new generation of men and women to himself. He is revealing his amazing love and his plan to them. Their hearts are being set on fire. I am excited by how God is using them and calling them to himself.

Thank you for partnering with us in this crucial mission. We were called for such a time as this to reach, call, form, and send the next generation of missionary disciples into the world. We could not do this without you. Thank you for your prayers and for adding your strength and conviction to ours! The call of Jesus is a call worth giving your whole life to. 


I remember bringing these frustrations to the Lord and he first told me how much he loved me, and the joy he found in spending time with me through prayer. Then he asked me to surrender my time and busy schedule to him and asked me if I would spend an hour of daily prayer with him. I said yes and committed to an hour of daily prayer with him. This choice drastically changed my relationship with the Lord, and it grew to be more intimate and stronger than ever before. I could hear the Lord speak to me much more clearly and he changed my heart. I was able to open up and be more vulnerable with God and my women's group, and through that I was able to start to receive healing from past wounds. I learned how powerful prayer is and was able to see the fruit of it in my own life and the people around me.

In the fall of my junior year a friend asked me if I had ever considered being a UCO missionary. I immediately answered "Yeah I don't think that's for me," but then that whole year I felt a constant nudge from the Lord to become a missionary. I finally decided to discern it after I realized my only reasons not to do it were based around fears that I was not qualified enough. I surrendered this to the Lord, and he told me not to fear because all I had to do was have a willing and open heart towards him, and he would use me.

I realized that I had loved getting to lead a Bible study, community groups, and help build women's community over these past few years and the Lord showed me how much joy it brought to my life. My excitement to be a missionary and serve the Lord in this way continually grew, which eventually surpassed all my fears. The Lord also showed me the sorrow of his heart for the college students who are lost and looking for love in the wrong places. This impacted my heart deeply and inspired me to want to take part in the Great Commission, particularly ministering to college women who feel lost and broken.

I am very excited to be joining the UCO staff team for this upcoming year, and I can't wait to see what the Lord has in store for UCO!





### JUSTIN KINVILLE

Three years ago, I did not believe in God. My story begins at the start of my sophomore year where I was invited to this thing called UCO. I quickly noticed something peculiar about this group of college Christians: the way they worshiped. They were either crazy or stupid! Or they knew something I didn't. This paradox sparked a determined curiosity in me. So, when Paul, a UCO Missionary, asked to meet up with me to chat I just told him, "Yes! I want to know everything. I want to either believe in God or not. No more uncertainty."

All my life I had the perspective of an atheist. I sometimes went to church, and I internalized the moral teachings, but I filtered out the parts related to God. But as I met with Paul, we began to read a book called Mere Christianity. Eventually when Paul asked me why I didn't believe in God, I realized I didn't have a good answer. Paul and I met regularly and the more we talked, I began to realize I was beginning to believe in God! To be clear, it was a sort of rational assent—I had become a convinced Deist. See, there was still all this "Jesus stuff" to figure out and that just didn't make sense. I mean to be 100% God and 100% man. That's 200%! That's too many percents!

Eventually Paul invited me to a UCO retreat. I agreed to go and was trying to keep an open mind but the whole area of faith was becoming incredibly difficult. My initial curiosity was turning into frustration. "I believe in God, but why don't I know him? Where is he?"

As I strolled into one of the last sessions of that retreat I saw a different UCO missionary, Travis, standing off to the side. He waved me over and asked, "Hey, do you have any questions or concerns about what's going on at this retreat?" So, I told him everything: how I'd been doing those last few months, how I was becoming angry that God wasn't in my life, and how part of me didn't even want him to—that in some ways it was easier not to believe!

Travis just said, "Yeah, cool... Do you mind if I pray with you about that?" I responded, "Sure, whatever." So, he put his hand on my shoulder and he prayed. And nothing happened. The original curiosity that turned to frustration, now became desperation. I walked away and found a little pocket of empty seats, and I prayed. For the first time in my life, I actually prayed.

I said, "God I'm frustrated. I have tried, really tried to know you. Why do I get nothing in return? Please God, if you're real, prove it to me, in a way only you can." And suddenly, I heard God speak to me like he was in the seat next to me. He said, "Justin, I'm frustrated, too! I have been proving my existence since the beginning of time, do you think I excluded you? You want proof, here's proof!"

Then like a movie my whole life played out in my head. It was every gift God had given me, every torturous moment he stood by me with a hand on my shoulder, every moment he shaped me, and every moment he paid close attention to my life. I was crying. And laughing. I wanted to go grab a mic and tell everyone. but my legs were giving out from under me because I was completely overwhelmed with the love of God. And I knew that my prayer—my only prayer—had been answered. It was all far too emotional for a person that just didn't emote. It could only have been God. A moment later, so many things came together for me. I knew that God could do anything, even be 100% God and 100% man. It took me another year to realize that beyond knowing God, living for him will be my life-long struggle, my life-long goal, and my life-long desire! And not living for some impersonal "god" but that God—the one that has loved me so passionately for the last 21 years, the one that called me to himself when I had convinced myself he didn't exist, the one who died for me so that I could be with him forever. That God is more than deserving of all my life.

And I'm excited to give a portion of it to him next year as a UCO missionary. Make room Paul and Travis, I'm joining the team!

Rise from your fear, from your loneliness, and from your sin. Begin to live in peace, joy, and freedom. And then join us in proclaiming him to the world!

We have members from Protestant, Catholic, Orthodox, and Messianic traditions. Given the breadth of what we hold in common, we seek to share as much of the life of discipleship as possible and encourage one another in our participation in our own churches.






Although campus COVID restrictions impacted our work over the last two years, our evangelistic efforts are back on track.

This year, we were able to reach over 1,300 students with Christ-centered friendships. Further, over 215 students attended our high impact "Fan into Flame" weekend retreat.

Because we were hindered in reaching new students in 2020 (but people still graduated) we are down to 112 student missionaries.





As these students recruit for and lead our on-campus Bible studies, the number of participants is likewise down slightly to 401. We're hopeful that we will add many people to our student Formation Communities in the fall, but it may take a couple of years to build back at all our chapters.

We're ready to do our part, and we're praying for the Lord of the Harvest (Matthew 9:38) to provide the growth!

We do note that during COVID, the core of our life was strengthened. Students experienced loyal care from our missionaries, fraternal love and affection from one another, and a closer walk with Jesus Christ.

The result? For the coming year, we will be welcoming our largest missionary class ever! And all of them have committed to a two-year service period. Praise God for his faithfulness!





### WE'RE GOING TO KENTUCKY!

In answer to many prayers and plans over many years, UCO is expanding. This fall, we will be launching a new chapter in Lexington, KY at the University of Kentucky!

It has been abundantly clear throughout the process that the Lord has led us very specifically to this city and campus. Out of the various cities we looked at, Lexington stood out both strategically and spiritually. It checked all our boxes regarding size of the student body, cost of living, job market, city size, geographic location, and others.

Most importantly, as our team prayed and met with local ministry leaders and pastors there was a strong and clear spiritual invitation to plant in this city and at this university. One pastor told us after hearing our vision, "We need you here!"

Already, the Lord is opening doors and has provided students and a faculty advisor to help us launch as an official ministry on the campus in the fall. In the short term, our goal is to build a fruitful outreach on the campus of University of Kentucky and a missional community in the city.

Longer term, our hope is that planting in Lexington will also lead to future plants, perhaps in nearby cities like Louisville. Nashville. Knoxville. or others.



Lexington is centrally located in the Bluegrass Region of the state and attracts Kentucky residents from across the entire state. The population of the city is 320,000 people with well over 500,000 in the metro area. This region of Kentucky is especially famous for its surrounding horse farms and bourbon distilleries. University of Kentucky is our first UCO chapter in the Southeastern Conference. There are over 30,000 college students at University of Kentucky. Fewer than 1,000 are actively involved in a Christian student group.


