## **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**



It's been an exciting year of mission for us as we launched a new Outreach at the University of Kentucky! As many of you know, this has been a goal and focus for us for the last couple years and it has been amazing to see a combination

of vision, training and a lot of prayer culminate in 7 staff landing in Kentucky in July. Throughout the journey of recruiting a team, finding housing, moving down and launching our outreach, there were a lot of twists and turns. Through it all there has been one consistent theme - God's faithfulness and provision! I invite you to be inspired by reading more about God's work in Kentucky later in this report.

Another substantial change worth mentioning is that University Christian Outreach became its own 501(c)3 this year. In the past, our non-profit status was shared with the Sword of the Spirit and other partner organizations dating back many years. With these partner's blessing and encouragement, we have launched and moved our operations to the new *University Christian Outreach*. We hope this will bring many blessings including a dedicated Board, operational efficiencies and the ability to own our own houses, which has been a goal for many years.

One of the things the Lord has spoken to us comes from John 15:3-4:

Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in me. I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing.

I find these words to be comforting and challenging at the same time. What a comfort and strength to know that the living God desires to abide in us. I grew up in a Catholic homeschool family, so I learned a lot about my faith growing up and my family was active in our church. I learned a lot about the theology, teachings, and traditions of my faith, but I never knew about having a personal relationship with God. I encountered the Lord's love for me for the first time at a youth group retreat in high school, but I still didn't know how to respond or how to develop this relationship.

Coming into college, I heard about UCO through my brother who was a missionary in Lansing at the time. Through him, I got to know a student who was helping lead the women's household, and she would invite me and many other college freshmen to dinner at their house before UCO events. It was at those dinners that I began to see the genuine friendships in UCO and the unique way that they loved one another. I joined a discipleship group and attended Fan Into Flame in February, and then chose to commit to joining Formation.

The following year was very challenging. It was 2020, I was commuting, and I was doing both work and online school full-time. I was still confused about how to grow my relationship with the Lord, so I was relying on myself to figure out my problems instead of bringing them to God. During all of that, my UCO small group was an amazing help and support to me.

Hearing the Lord speak through these women provided real comradery and encouragement as I navigated one of the most difficult years of my life.

I made it through that year by the grace of God, but my prayer life had taken a hit. Then came Campus Mission Academy, a week-long student missionary training that UCO hosts in the summer.

All those months of not seeking Him caught up with me. I was tired of it - tired of things failing when I tried to take control, tired of not feeling His presence, tired of giving all I could and not seeing any fruit. So, at the prayer meeting on Tuesday night, I just let it all out. I told the Lord how upset and tired I was, and I gave up trying to do it myself. In that surrender, I heard the Lord's voice again, and I felt His deep longing for me to come to Him. I felt His acceptance of my brokenness, my anxiousness, of every part of me that I was frustrated with and ashamed of. In that moment, I realized the Lord truly desired for me to know Him. and for the first time I wanted to know Him more.

Coming back from that retreat, I moved into the UCO women's household, where I was surrounded by women who were seeking the Lord as intentionally or more intentionally than I was. We had morning prayer three times a week, and we'd often end up taking our personal prayer times together. Just by seeing these women taking their relationships with the Lord so seriously brought about a revival in my own prayer life. I received advice and tips from my mentor, my house leaders, my small group, and my friends, and I found inspiration in the different ways all of these people were seeking the Lord.

Since last year, my relationship with the Lord has strengthened and deepened. I cannot say that it has been easy, but I can say that it has been worth it. The Lord has shown me how deeply He loves me, and how faithfully He is with me. He has put the men and women of UCO into my life to be His instruments - His hands and feet - to be the people who speak the truth into my life and the lives of every student they encounter.

Before I came to college I did not know God personally, but there had always been a spark of desire inside me to know Him more.

I came to college with a couple of different competing mindsets. There was a part of me that wanted to live the "normal college experience": to spend most of my time partying and maybe go to class from time to time. But there was also this part of me that wanted to investigate my desire to know God more. My first week on campus, I was roaming around our student group fair and found myself in the religious section. I had checked out a few groups, but then something gravitated me towards a table with a poster that said UCO. I walked up to a guy named Josh, who invited me to check out a bible study.

The bible study was pretty good! I kept going and became close with some of the guys in the group, but I still didn't feel like I knew God personally yet. Little did I know, God's work had already begun.

One of the guys from the Bible study, Nate, asked to get lunch with me. While we were eating he asked me about my personal story and my relationship with Christ. He ended up sharing with me the basics of who Jesus is and how he overcomes the gap of sin that is between us and God. In that moment, Nate helped me offer my life to the Lord and accept Christ as my savior!

It was an important moment, but afterward I still didn't feel like my relationship with God was very different.

Where things changed was at the Fan into Flame Retreat. On Saturday night at the retreat, there was a prayer time where we could be prayed with to be Baptized in the Holy Spirit. A group of guys prayed with me, and I verbally confessed, once again, Jesus as my Lord and Savior. The group kept praying and began speaking in words I could not understand - but somehow I also could. I felt an immense wave of joy come over me, and the only way I can describe it is that I felt more loved than I could ever imagine. Afterwards, I couldn't help but praise the Lord loudly in worship, and I declared to him once again that I wanted to give him my whole life.

After this past year, I have grown so much in the Lord! I have been going to Small Group, Alpha Group, Mission Community, and helping lead Men's Events. The community and accountability UCO has provided has no doubt contributed immensely towards my faith, and I would not be where I am right now without them.


# **OUR MISSION**



# KENTUCKY PLANT UPDATE

Our UCO team has only just finished its first year serving at the University of Kentucky, but already God has confirmed to us - he brought us here for a great purpose! Our plan for the year was simple: meet as many students as possible, learn about this new place that God has brought us to, and present ourselves to God to see what he might do. God has responded, quite frankly, by blowing our expectations out of the water.

The Lord has enabled us, with four full-time missionaries, to have evangelistic conversations with more than 250 students in the first month of the year. He's building a vibrant Christian student community as we meet weekly in a dingy-but-endearing campus sub-basement. We've quickly become a part of God's people here as he connects us with other ministries who have supported and offered us their friendship. We've been able to form both men's and women's discipleship small groups that meet weekly.

We've also seen his profound concern for each individual student. Many of those who come to Bible Study are new to faith in Jesus Christ or are turning away from serious sin for the first time in their lives. Students are learning how to share openly with others and how to pray. They've expressed to us what a difference it makes for them to be connected to a God who loves and provides for them. One student we met told us that he had just recently asked God for help in giving his life to him, but that he just needed connection with Christians and didn't know where to turn. He later told us that he knew, as soon as we started speaking with him, that this was God answering his prayer.

God's timing is perfect! He has placed us on this campus to join the work he has already begun. There's a sense shared among God's people here in Lexington: that God is putting the pieces together to do something incredible for his glory. With spiritual awakenings and revivals breaking out all over the country, including at Asbury University just 15 miles away, we know that God is going to show his victorious arm. We are glad to have been called here to be used and to see what he will do!

# UCO HOUSEHOLDS

Our UCO households are a place where participants can learn essential relational skills and develop meaningful friendships based on things that last.
