Coming into college, it was by God's plan alone that I discovered UCO. I considered looking for a church in my third week of freshman year, and I saw a flyer in my dorm offering a ride to a local church. I grew up Christian and wanted to continue going to church on Sundays, but I wasn't looking for much more than a weekly service at the time. When the next Sunday rolled around, I was picked up by a UCO staffer and first introduced to the ministry.

I started college determined to make a career for myself as a professional cellist. I spent my high school years pouring into this, and my days consisted of disciplined hours of practicing. My commitment to the cello had become unhealthy. I was looking for an identity and fulfillment in how I played, and I had no grace for myself when I couldn't reach the unrealistic standards I had set. I was apprehensive about joining something like UCO at first. Joining UCO would mean I would have to sacrifice time I had been putting into practicing my instrument. The environment of the music school had led me to feeling guilty if I hadn't made cello my highest priority.

At my first UCO event, I was struck by how welcoming the students and staffers I were. I felt so cared for personally, and I discovered a kind of love that didn't hinge on what I could provide in turn. Through the kindness I received from UCO, I began to see how the Lord's love for me was unconditional and completely separate from anything I could ever earn. My relationship with the cello began to heal gradually as I offered myself grace and put more time into the friendships in my life.

Being a part of mission community my sophomore and junior year of college taught me what it meant to live as a Christian on a daily basis. My faith had been important to me growing up, but it was something I was brought into because of my family. I had not yet experienced having a personal relationship with the Lord and being in a community like my UCO chapter. The Lord put a calling on my heart to seek out Christian friendships and to walk with Him more closely.

Going into my junior year, I started to feel that the Lord was calling me to re-examine my desires again. I was still loving the cello, but I realized that many aspects of the career didn't align with what I wanted moving forward. God offered me grace and guidance through this, and my family and friends in UCO helped me through determining what the next steps for me might be.

It is difficult to describe all the ways that UCO has grown my faith and poured into me. I reflect often about how the Lord's plan placed me into UCO when it was not something I had been seeking out on my own. UCO provided me the community support I needed, especially being far away from my family in Louisiana. The friendships and mentoring have taught me so much about what it looks like to live for the Lord.

Growing up I lived what I'd consider to be a "loose Christian life." I attended a public school and my family only really went to church when it was convenient for us. I surely believed in God, but my relationship with Him was limited and left a lot to be desired.

I decided in high school that I wanted a fresh start. For this reason, I went from Cleveland, Ohio to the University of Kentucky, where I arrived not knowing a single person or having a single friend with me. During freshman welcome week, the Christian organizations on campus really caught my attention, as I wanted to make friends but also longed to get closer to God. I met one of the missionaries, Steven, in the dining hall during the first week and instantly felt that I was wanted and valued by UCO.

Soon I was attending UCO Bible studies consistently, building relationships with the other students, and most importantly, growing immensely in my relationship with God. My faith was getting deeper and deeper, I was going to church regularly, praying powerfully, and I truly felt the presence of the Lord in my life.

The end of 2022 ended with a massive challenge for my faith. I was hit with the death of a very close family member, and suddenly my emotional and spiritual health was completely out of tune. I was reverting to old ways of giving little effort to my faith, and dwelling heavily on why God would present me with such incredible hardship if He really loved me so deeply.

As time progressed, I slowly built my way back. Coming back to UCO events after winter break really helped me continue in the right direction.

But despite all this help, I still wasn't feeling completely right for over a year after the death of my family member.

I really desired to find peace in the situation but just couldn't get there. Thankfully UCO presented me with the perfect opportunity to find exactly what I needed.



### OUR MISSION

In 2001, Jim Collins' popular business book "Good to Great" was published and it quickly became a bestseller. One of the ideas Collins talks about in the book is the "hedgehog principle". The idea is that the hedgehog is not great at many things but excels in one area, namely, rolling into a ball and protecting itself from predators. Collins recommends that organizations should know what area they excel at and focus on it above all others.

What is UCO's hedgehog principle? This is a question a group of our leaders were asking this year. As we prayed and discussed what we came to was not a new revelation or major change of direction but rather a deeper clarity on who we are and what we are meant to do. Put in a sentence:

We build communities that form college students to live as lifelong disciples who impact the world for Jesus Christ.

The heart of our mission is community. In fact, missional community is our mission. When college students connect with UCO, we want them to find a deep community rooted in the love of God — a community that is overflowing with that love to go right back onto campus to reach the lost and welcome them in. May the Lord lead us on all of our campuses to build these missional communities on the firm foundation of Jesus Christ!

We want to bring students from various places in their faith journey and form them into mature, lifelong, missionary disciples of Jesus Christ. To do this we engage students through a four-part strategy:




